

Frigid winter? New Englanders will pay through frozen noses for oil and gas

Residential consumers in New England are expected to pay an average of 26.3 cents per kilowatt hour for electricity and \$19.90 per thousand cubic feet for gas in January 2023, up more than 15% from last year and the most on record for both during January, according to EIA data going back to 1997.






Illustrative Electric Bill Breakdown


Projected annual energy use, with and without behind-the-meter solar and energy efficiency

Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) & Infrastructure Investment & Jobs Act (IIJA)

✓ IRA - Many opportunities for municipalities

DIRECT PAY "Tax Credits" for renewable energy investments equivalent to private investment (30% + adders), battery storage & interconnection costs
EV INFRASTRUCTURE RESILIENCY STRETCH CODE ADOPTION Support
CLEAN COMMERICAL VEHICLES up to \$40K direct pay credit for heavy veh.

IIJA - Grid Resilience Innovation Partnership Programs GRIP – \$10.5 B over 5 yrs.
Much of the funding open to local governments, encourages partnership with utilities
SMART GRID GRANTS facilitate integration of electrification, DERs, etc.
GRID INNOVATION PROGRAM investments that accelerate connecting of clean energy generation, utilization of distribution grid assets to provide backup power and reduce transmission requirements & more.

What is Community Power?

New Hampshire cities, towns, and counties can become **default electricity provider** for their residents + businesses and provide related services.




RSA 53-E, Relative to Aggregation of Electric Customers by Municipalities & Counties

Customers may switch back to utility default supply or take service from a Competitive Supplier

Community Power programs must be paid for out of revenues received from participating customers

Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire

- Community-governed not-for-profit Joint Power Agency formed on 10/1/21
- ★ *22 Members representing:
 - 20% of NH population
 - o ~119,000 customers
 - o ~960,000 MWh/year
 - ~\$150 million / year revenues (controlled by communities)
- ✓ Target windows for program launch:
 - Spring 2023 for 12 Members
 - Spring 2024 for 8 Members






- > Creates an intra-state (within NH) market for <5 MW Distributed Generation & Storage

- > Make DERs part of supply portfolio for Community Power programs as direct off-takers
- > Build local economies, self-reliance, sustainability and resilient communities

Electric Grid is Sized for Highest Hour of Demand


Whole Energy System (T, D & G) Sized to Meet Peak Demand, With a Safety Margin




