In 2024, the U.S. Department of Justice amended the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Title II regulations to include specific accessibility standards for websites and mobile applications operated by public entities. Why and How to Adopt C-PACER Energy Financing: Overview and Case Studies

Commercial Property Assessed Clean Energy and Resiliency (C-PACER) is a program that helps commercial property owners and developers access advantageous private-sector financing for improvements intended to decrease water or energy consumption/demand. Commercial projects within a municipality that has opted-in to a C-PACER program are eligible for this special financing, including commercial and industrial, as well as residential property containing 5 or more units. Eligible property may be owned by any type of business, corporation, individual, or nonprofit organization permitted by state law. The Lebanon City Council voted unanimously in March to establish a C-PACER district, making Lebanon the first city in New Hampshire to adopt the program. The town of Bristol quickly followed, with its vote at Town Meeting approving adoption of the program. In addition, an overview of the C-PACER program, you will hear from each of these municipalities about what it took to adopt C-PACER and what the program means for local economic development.

ADA Overview Part I: Disability Discrimination

Municipal employers are prohibited from discriminating against employees or applicants based on their membership in a protected class, including being an individual with a physical or mental disability. While this obligation has become an ingrained and accepted principle, many municipal employers are nonetheless presented with challenging questions regarding employee rights and what constitutes discrimination under the law. This presentation will provide municipal employers with a practical overview of federal and state employment discrimination laws and review the responsibilities of supervisors, human resources professionals, and elected officials in maintaining a lawful and respectful workplace. This session will cover discrimination and harassment laws and obligations, with a focus on disability discrimination. Attendees will learn how discrimination claims arise, how to recognize problematic workplace conduct, and how to respond appropriately to complaints and workplace concerns. Municipal Facility Design to Meet Current Threats and Safety Concerns

As we navigate the 21st century, threats to buildings and staff continue to increase. Cottage Courts and the NH Communities Embracing Them

In an effort to address New Hampshire’s housing deficit, communities across the state are embracing “missing middle” housing. This is especially true for cottage courts, sometimes called cottage clusters or pocket neighborhoods. In recent years, several communities have adopted cottage court ordinances including Keene, New London, Fitzwilliam, Antrim, Hampton, Bedford, and others. Cottage courts are generally small (ranging from 400-1,200 square feet) detached single-family homes clustered around a shared green space. Perfect as starter homes or places to downsize, these small, clustered homes are an aesthetically pleasing way to promote infill development and gentle density. In this session, attendees will hear from leaders in communities that have adopted cottage court or pocket neighborhood ordinances, some of which have resulted in approved projects. Speakers will share the successes and challenges of adopting the ordinance, including the response from community members and housing developers.
