



Standards for Perfluorinated Chemicals (PFAS)





- PFAS Lawsuit Update
- SB 496 state contribution towards costs for PFAS compliance
- HB 1603 PFAS contamination remediation and mitigation revolving loan fund
- HR 12 urges Congress to declare PFAS superfund chemicals and provide sufficient programming and funding for education, treatment, and remediation

Exemptions and Credits




- ► HB 1125 exemption for volunteer firefighters and EMS personnel
- ► HB 1210 exemption for energy storage system
- HB 1510 exemption for accessory dwelling units (ADU) leased to non-family members
- HB 1154 exclude retirement savings and pension from net assets to determine eligibility for certain exemptions
- ► HB 1305 exempts income from a home-share arrangement from the determination of net assets for certain property tax exemptions
- SB 516 standard credit of \$50 (local option up to \$750) for active military personnel

NH Retirement System





- ► HB 1205 changes 10% pension reduction to full Social Security age rather than age 65 Estimated cost = \$37 million
- pension reform provisions enacted in 2011 for Group II members (police and firefighters) Estimated cost = \$142 million
- ► HB 1235 committee to study ensuring workforce maintenance through enhancement of the retirement system











Planning and Zoning





- HB 1129 allows posting notice of zoning amendment hearing on website rather than in newspaper
- HB 1629 provides for mandatory training, stricter deadlines, fee shifting
- HB 1632 provides financing options and tax relief for affordable housing
- SB 458 prohibits local regulation of short-term rentals
- SB 482 requires all municipalities to allow "tiny houses"

Right-to-Know Law



- ► HB 1169 eliminates roll call requirement for meetings by telephone
- ► HB 1170 adds definition of "reasonably described"
- HB 1202 requires notice and opportunity to attend nonpublic session based on reputation
- ► HB 1307 allows charging for personnel costs to produce records if more than five hours in a calendar month
- HB 1325 requires list of all non-public sessions where minutes have been sealed
- HB 1559 requires sealed minutes to be reviewed annually for unsealing

Lemonade Stands

HB 1147 - prohibits a municipality from regulating a lemonade stand operated by a person under 18





Net Metering

HB 1218 - identical to HB 365 from last year -- raises cap for customer-generator to 5 megawatts

SB 159 - retained from 2019 - virtually identical to HB 365 and HB 1218

HB 1225 - allows net metering for municipal hydroelectric facilities up to 5 megawatts

HB 1402 - allows net metering for a "municipal host" to offset energy costs for customers within a single municipality

HB 1481 - allows net metering above 1 megawatt up to 125 percent of customer's average monthly peak electric demand





HB 1661 - eliminates pollution control exemption for nuclear and fossil fuel generating facilities





Housing Appeals Board


- SB 487 repeals housing appeals board, establishes commission to advance affordable housing options
- SB 536 establishes a committee to study housing appeals board; does not repeal

Labor Issues





- ► HB 1399 and SB 448 "card check" provision allows public employees to unionize by majority written authorization without PELRB-supervised election
- to vote in the PELRB election by mail
- HB 1181 authorizes PELRB to award damages for pain and suffering in unfair labor practice claim

Fees and State Aid



- ► HB 1160 hotel occupancy fee from room rentals for capital reserve fund, revolving fund, or tourism support fund
 - NHMA Policy
- ► HB 1649 road usage fee
- ► HB 1650 annual adjustment to state motor vehicle registration fee
- HB 1565 requiring meals and rooms tax operators to pay a portion (1%) of the tax collected to the municipality where the business is located

Municipal Finance

► HB 1119 - allows municipal and county treasurers to deposit funds in out-of-state banks that have a physical branch and presence in this state



➤ SB 456 - permits capital reserve funds of counties, towns, districts, and water departments to be used for financing the cost of leasing equipment





Technology-Related Bills

- Communications Districts
 - ▶ SB 457
 - Allows two or more municipalities to create district
 - Follows basic structure of 53-B,Solid Waste Management Districts
 - Not the only bill on broadband
- Cybersecurity Standards
 - Requires the DolT to set minimum cyber security standards
 - Requires municipalities to "selfreport" compliance with standards
 - Requires municipalities to report a cyber security incident to DolT

Happy New Year!

This Legislative Bulletin provides some more information on bills that have been introduced for the New Hampshire General Court's 2020 session, including a continued listing of all the bills we have identified so far that could affect local government. (See our December 19 Legislative Bulletin for the beginning of the list.) Once the legislature begins scheduling hearings, there will be little time to get organized, so please start checking out the legislation, contacting your representatives and senators, and contacting NHMA with any questions.

As mentioned in the **December 19 Bulletin**, the House and Senate will convene (separately) on Wednesday, January 8, to begin the 2020 legislative session. On that day (and continuing on January 9 in the House), they will take action on bills from 2019 that were retained (in the House) or re-referred (in the Senate). The December 19 Bulletin also contains a description of the retained/re-referred bill process.

Retained and Re-Referred Bills

To our knowledge, there is no published list of all the retained and rereferred bills, but you can find a list of those of most interest to municipalities in our June 21, 2019, Legislative Bulletin (page 4). Also, if you do a search for all 2020 bills on the General Court website (under "Find a 2020 Bill," leave the field blank and click on the search icon), the resulting list will include both retained/re-referred bills and new bills. Any House bill with a number below 1000 is a re-tained bill, and any Senate bill with a number below 400 is a re-referred bill.

The most common committee recommendations on retained and rereferred bills are "inexpedient to legislate" and "refer for interim study," and most of them will meet one of those fates. Some, however, are recommended for passage. In most cases, these bills were retained/rereferred in the originating chamber; if they are passed, they will cross over to the other chamber for hearing and final action, so further work can be done on them if needed. Here are a few of them. [Note that for all bills except SB 159, the proposed amendment replaces the entire bill, or everything except the effective date.): 2020 NHMA Legislative Bulletin 02


