- Read NHMA's 2023-2024 Policies & Principles







2021-2022 Balance of Power



It Will Be Incredibly Difficult to Get Traction in the House

Every House session is going to come down to how many of which side shows up.

There will be no way to predict this number.

Delta could be +/- 10 for every bill.



This is very different from every other year.

2022 delta was 20-30, favoring the Republicans.

Had to put in effort where we <u>didn't</u> want the majority party to get what it wanted.



House Committee Recommendations Have Limited Usefulness this Session

- Committee recommendations will only tell us whether everyone agrees on the bill, or whether we will have to see who shows up on voting day.
- This means that we will have to be very strategic about when to whip votes for or against something, as we'll be asking both sides to cross the aisle.





House Statistics 2022

~1/8 of votes were bipartisan

Sponsorship statistics varied

- "Moderates" -1/3 1/2 of sponsored bills were bipartisan.
- Everyone else 1/5 or less of sponsored bills were bipartisan.

2023 Statistics

- Senators have until January 12th for final sign-off, and the House Rules Committee gave some waivers for late filing of bills (notably the budget bill), so it is too early to say what kind of bipartisan sponsorship is likely this year.
- However, it stands to reason that on policy issues where there is an impetus among both party's leadership in the House and Senate leadership to "do something," we're probably more likely to see compromises reached and bills arrive on the Governor's desk. Why?
 - The conversation can be between leadership coalitions rather than various groups within parties.
 - The number of policy areas that are likely to garner bipartisan interest in compromise is small, so few conversations likely to be ongoing.
- The bigger question this year is the budget trailer bill and what policies will be in it.

Bills to Watch: NHMA Policy Bills, Policy Topics, and Bills of Interest



Legislative Preview

- An exercise in trying to predict what ideas will catch fire in a dynamic environment comprised of over 424 individuals, all with different ideas about what, exactly, should happen.
- Impossible to predict how many of these bills will be relevant in June 2023.
- However, we do know that the big one will be the budget trailer bill, HB 2.
 - We are confident that HB 2 will contain substantive policies that will impact New Hampshire.
 - Not yet sure what impact those policies will have on municipalities.
 - The final version of HB 2 will likely begin to take shape after cross-over, with final policy decisions being made in the last hour of the last day of the Committee of Conference that is almost certain to happen.



Bill Data: January 9, 2022

More than 1,000 LSRs filed – More than any prior election year. More than 50 LSRs withdrawn – more than a dozen with a municipal component.

283 bills being tracked by NHMA, so far.

Conversations going with dozens of legislators and lobbyists about their bills and bill ideas.



Some Important Policy Topics

Marijuana – Several bills being advanced. Unclear whether pre-session negotiation.
However, House Majority & House Minority Leaders support the same one.

Bail Reform – Ongoing negotiations between interested legislators, but unclear how that will develop.

Composting – Big push coming to start putting composting infrastructure in place, particularly for food scraps, as a way to stave off landfills reaching capacity.

Primary Date – Lots of conversation surrounding moving the date of the state primary.

State Funding – Perpetual issue made more difficult by infusion of federal dollars, which will shortly be drying up.



Some Important Bills: NHMA Policy Bills

HB 50: relative to payment by the state of a portion of retirement system contributions of political subdivision employers – restoring a portion of the state's share of employer costs for police, teachers, and firefighters in NHRS.

LSR 297: relative to remote participation in public meetings under the right to know law – providing for a local option remote participation of members of public bodies in public meetings.







Stay Informed

The Legislative Bulletin is NHMA's primary means of communicating legislative information to member towns and cities.


Sent via email and posted on the <u>NHMA website</u>.

The Legislative Bulletin highlights important bills as they move through the legislative process.

It also serves as a communication vehicle for action needed from your municipality, including:

- Requests for letters or calls in support or opposition.
- In person testimony

Occasionally, NHMA issues legislative alerts by email for special purposes, during legislative session.



NHMA hosts a series of webinars during the session to brief members on the key bills impacting NH municipalities, their effect if passed by the legislature, current status, and any action needed by member towns and cities.

Ways to Engage your Legislator

- ✓ Provide your legislators with summaries of issues that are important to your town or city;
 - ✓ include accurate facts and data.
- ✓ Invite them to address a council meeting;
 - ✓ participate in city/town-hosted events;
 - ✓ visit public meeting
 - ✓ highlight projects or facilities that are important to your municipality
- ✓ Conduct "informal" meetings;
 - ✓ invite business and community leaders, non-profit partner and other stakeholder groups.
- ✓ Respond to NHMA Legislative Bulletin or a legislative alert will frequently ask for your assistance in analyzing the effects of a bill or in communicating with legislators.




NHMA Bill Tracker: FastDemocracy

The New Hampshire Municipal Association (NHMA) represents the interests of cities and towns before the New Hampshire General Court (House and Senate) and various state agencies based on its member-adopted <u>principles and policies</u>. The New Hampshire legislative session happens each year between the months of January and June. Each legislative cycle, NHMA tracks state actions that could significantly affect New Hampshire's 234 municipalities.

In addition to the weekly Legislative Bulletin, NHMA provides members access to FastDemocracy, an online bill tracking platform, for efficient, real-time updates to legislative activity of interest to members. Members do not need to create a FastDemocracy account to access this information, but they are able to create an account if they wish.






