

### New Hampshire RSA 36-A

- Establishes Conservation Commissions
- Offers Direction to Commissions, but also allows for a broad range of activities
- This Approach Gives Great Latitude in how a Conservation Commission Achieves its Activities & Projects



# What is the Purpose of a Conservation Commission?

- Commission is the only local body charged with protecting natural resources
- Only local board authorized to "intervene" on Wetlands Applications
- Commission is Advisory

#### What MUST A Commission do?

- MUST be Advisory NOT Regulatory
- Conduct researches into its local land and water areas
- Maintain an Index of Open Space & Natural Resources
- Keep Accurate Records of Meetings & Actions



#### What MAY Commissions Do?

- Make Recommendations on matters concerning local natural resources
- May receive gifts of money and/or property
- May acquire land on behalf of a municipality
- May accept donations of land and CE's
- May advertise, prepare, print books, maps, pamphlets to promote work





#### NH RSA 36-A:2

**36-A:2 Conservation Commission.** – A city or town which accepts the provisions of this chapter may establish a conservation commission, hereinafter called the commission, for the proper utilization and protection of the natural resources and for the protection of watershed resources of said city or town. Such commission shall conduct researches into its local land and water areas and shall seek to coordinate the activities of unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes, and may advertise, prepare, print and distribute books, maps, charts, plans and pamphlets which in its judgment it deems necessary for its work....



# unofficial bodies organized for similar purposes

- Lake Associations
- Volunteer Trail Organizations
- Land Trusts
- Garden Clubs and Historical Societies
- Friends of Open Space ("Pisgah", "the Gorge", etc.)
- Environmental Education Centers
- Public Schools and colleges environmental programs and clubs



# Activities that Conservation Commission can help coordinate

- Water quality testing
- Trail development and maintenance
- Land protection
- School programs
- Public education and outreach
- Wetlands protection with town, lake association Wetlands Bureau, etc.




## Water Quality Testing





## **Protecting Water Quality**







# Potential partnership opportunities for commissions

- Trail building and maintenance—adopt a trail program and sponsor hikes






# Managing Conservation Land, Trails, & Easements:

- RSA 36-A:4 Specifies that any interest in land acquired in the name of the municipality by the conservation commission be managed by the commission.

#### Adopt-A-Trail Program 2013

The trails listed below need "adopters", someone who will walk them a few times a year to do routine maintenance, and also report back any major problems. "Routine maintenance" would include brush clearing, minor water diversion, sign replacement, littering, etc. "Major problems" would include those requiring chainsaw work, bridge replacement, major water or trail rerouting, etc.

- 1. Friedsam Town Forest:
- Ancient Oaks Trail
- Cemetery Loop
- Doug Sergeant Trail
- Audrey's Meander (requires work)
- The Ski Trail (requires work)
- 2. Vicinity of Madame Sherri's:
  - Ann Stokes Loop
- Daniels Mt. Loop
- Mine Ledge Trail
- Mt. Wantastiquet Trail
- On the Keene Connector: Trail work in this section requires some care as portions of the trail are quite remote. Please call for further discussion.
- Please call if you want to work on the Bear Mt. Trail or the Bear Mt. Connector, both trails being in Hinsdale.

#### **Vernal Pool Presentation and Visit**

A vernal pool is a temporary pool of water that provides a home for many animals such as frogs, turtles and salamanders. This habitat is unique because these pools only fill with water in the spring so fish cannot survive here, making it a safe place for animals to breed where they are safe from predation.

Come learn about this unique habitat that many frogs, salamanders, turtles and insects call home. There will be a short presentation at WES on Friday afternoon where we will learn about these special pools. Saturday we will spend some time exploring a pool right here in Washington. You will get wet!

## Increase Support for Funding

- Partnerships often Increase public support for project funding or town vote to support conservation
  - Town budget and special warrant articles
  - \$'s from private foundations
  - \$'s from gov't sources (LCHIP, NRCS, Mitigation Fund, Moose Plates, etc.)

# Benefits Include: potential new commission members

- Similar organizations often have individuals with demonstrated interest, expertise, and/or experience in conservation, environmental protection, or relevant aspects of land-use planning


### How to get a partnership started:



The Right-to-Know Law (RSA Chapter 91-A) affects every aspect of local government in our state. Every board, committee, commission, and sub-committee in every town, city and village district in New Hampshire must comply with this law. As a result, all local officials and employees must understand the law and their responsibilities regarding both public meetings and governmental records.

Join Legal Services Counsel Stephen Buckley, Government Affairs Counsel Cordell Johnston, and Staff Attorney Margaret Byrnes for a full day workshop on Thursday, September 14 on the Right-to-Know Law. They will address some of the most difficult issues under the law, including confidential information, electronic records and communication, procedures for nonpublic sessions, and communications outside a meeting. There will be ample time for questions and answers on all aspects of the law.
